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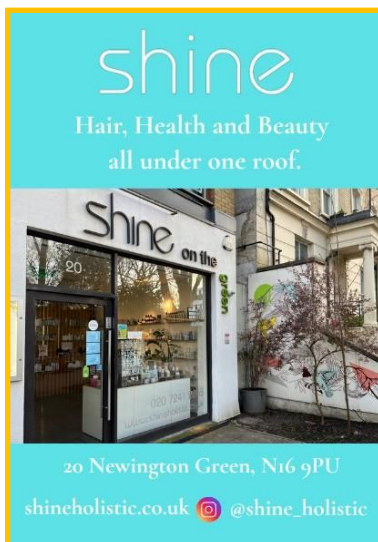


**Dr AMELIE ADDISON: a thumbnail sketch of William Shield's career-** William Shield (1748-1829) was born on industrial Tyneside and began his career playing fiddle for touring theatre companies. From c.1771 he performed with London opera orchestras and was house composer at Covent Garden Theatre 1783-1797. His chamber music represents his love of social musicmaking, with friends including members of both the radical Stoke Newington set and the royal family. In 1787 Shield joined the King's Musicians in Ordinary, and in 1817 was appointed Master of the King's Music. Although buried in Westminster Abbey, his grave remained unmarked until Newcastle MP Joseph Cowen spearheaded a campaign to rectify this in 1893.



**RACHEL BROWN: background to flute quartets by Viotti and Mozart** The tumultuous events of the revolution had a profound effect on the working lives of musicians in France. Some profited by the changes, but the Italian violinist and composer Giovanni Battista Viotti, who spent much of his working life in Paris, was forced to seek refuge in England, where he was a great success at Salmon's concerts in the Hanover Square Rooms and as manager and orchestral leader of the King's Theatre.

When Mozart arrived in Mannheim in October 1777, the musicians there received him with open arms, foremost among them the flautist Wendling and his family. When, after much petitioning, Mozart was informed that there would be no job for him, Wendling found him free accommodation and provided meals every day and a room in his house where he could compose. He found him some pupils and obtained a commission for him from Ferdinand De Jean, a wealthy Dutchman working as a doctor with the East India Company, who offered 200 gulden for "3 short, easy concertos, and a pair of quartets for the flute." However, it seemed that the time for composing was never right; social parties, gala celebrations or carnival festivities were forever on the agenda. This was also the period of Mozart's infatuation with the young singer Aloysia Weber. The D major flute quartet is dated Christmas Day 1777.
