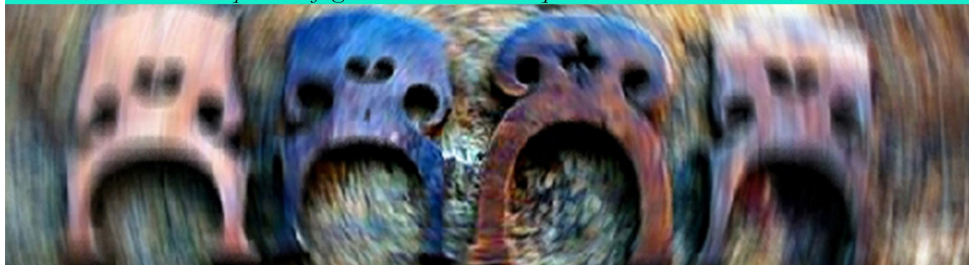

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Nicholas Mulroy on the music of Henry Purcell

Purcell wrote for a remarkable range of purposes: church music, state occasions (the amazing music for Queen Mary's funeral), friends down the pub, chamber music, intimate songs, the theatre. His output is staggering in both range and quality.

What we can see in the music is a tremendous receptivity to the musical currents of the time. He came into contact with Italian and French music in the royal households as European luminaries traveled through, and one of his many talents was to synthesise these styles and their elegance and bravura with his own music - he'd studied especially with John Blow - and make it something simultaneously English and universal. There seems to have been a free exchange of ideas and aesthetics with other leading musicians across the Channel. Purcell was especially interested in what French music could do, and had a competitive friendship with Lully in particular.

Purcell has no equal when it comes to setting the English language. His ear for the musical semantics, his ability to manipulate harmony and dissonance, is that of an utter master, and places him alongside Schubert, Verdi, and Monteverdi as the supreme composer when it comes to elevating poetry into music.
